Current role and description of a typical work week: As a Research Assistant with the ERGP, I provide research support to our roster of technical experts, helping formulate research plans, creating models and collecting data for projects conducted around the world. Since beginning work with the ERGP, I have continued the work of the "Where in the World are Canadian Oil and Gas Companies?" project and have assisted with a collaborative project between the ERGP and Tecnológico de Monterrey in Mexico.

How the MPP program has furthered my career: The MPP program provided me with theoretical skills, such as economic theory and game theory, and applicable skills, such as government engagement and writing policy documents. The Capstone Project, where I addressed natural gas and natural gas liquid royalty regimes in BC, was my first opportunity to display all the skills I learned in the program, which are skills that are now essential to the day-to-day operations of my current role.

Advice for someone entering the MPP program: Get to know your MPP cohort. The most invaluable lesson from the program is learning how to work with a team of individuals with diverse academic and career backgrounds. Learning to use your classmates' backgrounds will show you how to look at one issue through several lenses.
