IDEAS/Repec released their global top 25% of policy schools as of 2022 and **The School of Public Policy at the University of Calgary ranked #31 in March**, climbing two spots from #33 in 2020. The School of Public Policy is the only policy school in Canada to have made the list, and appears with policy schools from Harvard, Cornell, Columbia and Stanford to name a few.

IDEAS is the largest bibliographic database dedicated to Economics. Based on RePEc, it indexes over 3,300,000 items of research, including over 3,100,000 that can be downloaded in full text. The rankings are based on analysis from data gathered with the RePEc project.

The analysis covers journal articles, books, book chapters, working papers and software components that are indexed in RePEc. So far, over 2,000 archives from 102 countries have contributed about 3 million research pieces from 3,500 journals and 5,000 working paper series.

The School of Public Policy was founded with a vision to drive policy discourse with relevant research, outreach and teaching. Its faculty is composed of scholars with exceptional academic credentials and experienced practitioners in business, government and the non-profit sector.

The School's research is renowned for its independence, credibility and fact-based analysis. The School's influence is reflected by its wide dissemination among policy-makers, business leaders and the media; it is Canada's most cited policy school, by both traditional media and academic publications. Since its inception over a decade ago, the school has produced over 600 peer reviewed publications with over an astounding 80 publications in 2021.

This is an exceptional accomplishment to achieve this global ranking for a policy school with only 14 years of history. More remarkably, we are the only Canadian policy school with this achievement.

The Fiscal and Economic Policy Division harnesses the strengths of transdisciplinary scholarship to contribute policy research and expertise aimed at supporting inclusive growth and advancing discourse in this area. Our approach is rooted in an understanding of evidence that takes seriously both heterogeneity and intersectionality while being attentive to systems and structures of power to support inclusive economic growth while advancing and shaping discourse in this area.

MOROCCO: Master Executive Program in Mining Environment and Circular Economy

In November 2021, ERGP together with Morocco’s UM6P Polytechnic and the University of Quebec, launched the Master Executive Program in Mining Environment and Circular Economy.

KENYA: Project Closure and Ecological Restoration in Mining and Quarrying Industries - Mombasa, February 8-11, 2022

In partnership with Kipya Africa and Bamburi Haller Park, this four-day course provided decision makers and resource managers with an understanding of recovery processes for damaged or degraded ecosystems.

VICTORIA GOODDAY AND BRAEDEN LARSON

The paper found that when well operators default on their obligation to maintain the wells, landowners cannot collect timely compensation, and are required to apply to the Surface Rights Board to receive fair compensation from the provincial government. Landowners must shoulder the burden of the risks to their properties and livelihoods during this period. This issue is growing, as there are approximately 97,000 inactive wells in the province.

The Key Role of No-Carbon State-Owned Enterprises in Global Climate Action: Leveraging the G20 Forum to Accelerate the Energy Transition

LEONARDO BELTRAN-RODRIGUEZ, JUAN ROBERTO LOZANO-MAYA

This paper analyzes the role of state-owned enterprises (SOEs) and the ways in which their corporate governance, mandate, and scale have a competitive advantage in their readiness to embrace the new international low-carbon development framework. It examines how SOEs can help governments speed up their pace in the pathways towards decarbonization.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC: EIA and Community Engagement in the Mining Sector

SANTO DOMINGO, MARCH 24, 2021

In collaboration with the Embassy of Canada in the Dominican Republic, ERGP delivered a half day workshop that attracted local community leaders and the general public. The workshop demonstrated the importance of the environmental impact assessment process, with particular case studies from Canada.

50+ attendees from different levels of government, Vice Minister of Mines, Congressmen and Senators learned some of the tools for successful community engagement in Canada.

Outreach Events

CANADA: Prospectors & Developers Association of Canada (PDAC) Convention

MARCH 8-11, 2021

ERGP attended the PDAC meeting with key stakeholders in the mining industry. The team explored opportunities in new mining markets (Brazil, Ecuador, Mauritania, Spain, Burkina Faso, Peru, Chile, Turkey, Panama), and scheduled B2B meetings with prospective partners (Canada, Cuba, Costa Rica, Argentina, Guyana, Suriname). The Convention also offered sessions on current topics of interest, such as new technologies for mining exploration and ESG Management. The entire event was virtual due to pandemic restrictions.

BRAZIL: Simexmin 2021

AUGUST 9-12, 2021

ERGP participated in Brazil’s 2021 Simexmin Mining Conference. The expo saw hundreds of participants from around the world delve into the technical, political, social, economic and environmental realities of mining in Brazil and Latin America. With the support of the Canadian High Commission, ERGP presented to stakeholders in Brazil’s mining industry, sharing the ERGP mission to advance best practices in the extractives and build capacity with international partners.



KENYA: Diplomatic Mission to Calgary

SEPTEMBER 21, 2021

ERGP was privileged to host Kenya’s delegation to Canada at the School of Public Policy. The team met with the honorable members of the Kenyan Parliamentary Energy Committee, Kenya’s Head of Chancery to Canada, and the Canadian High Commissioner to Kenya. The meeting concentrated on the essential social and political considerations of resource development, especially in the areas of mining and exploration, as well as the crucial role both policy and education play.

CANADA: Global Energy Show

SEPTEMBER 21-23, 2021

Through the Canadian Trade Commissioner Service, ERGP met with industry leaders to discuss the importance of



sustainability, the rising demand for energy, and the many ways we can collaborate to keep building a better industry.

MITROVICA, OCTOBER 14-15, 2021

The University of Isa Boletini, along with Kosovo’s Independent Commission of Mines and Minerals, Ministry of Economic Development, and Geological Survey, welcomed ERGP Director, Deborah Archibald, as a keynote speaker at this conference. The virtual event carried two important themes: tools for sharing resource revenues and community participation in mineral development.

Master of Public Policy (MPP)

The University of Calgary Master of Public Policy (MPP) program is a one-year, integrated professional program that offers a comprehensive curriculum with numerous opportunities to further enhance skills, make meaningful connections with public policy experts and establish a career in the public policy field. Unlike traditional, theory based graduate programs, the Master of Public Policy provides opportunity to develop the knowledge and tools needed to investigate real world policy problems and to communicate policy solutions effectively. Within an elite class of about 40 students with diverse academic and professional backgrounds, learn from some of Canada's leading scholars, and meet local, national and global policy practitioners and thinkers. Career development will be fostered with mentorship and networking opportunities and with opportunities to win internship placements.
