Carlo Dade is Director for International Policy at the University of Calgary's School of Public Policy, where he also oversees the New North America Initiative, a multi-year initiative supported by the Government of Alberta to produce new research, thinking and connections to rethink the Canada-U.S. relationship.

Dade has been one of the country's leading voices in advancing Western Canadian trade interests in Canada and abroad. His research and advocacy have played a critical role in achieving better trade agreements and has a reputation for developing creative solutions to major challenges facing Canadian exporters and defending Canadian interests in trade with the United States and China.

A frequent media commentator and writer, Dade is a global expert on pan-Pacific trade, including the Trans-Pacific Partnership and Pacific Alliance trade blocs, as well as on agricultural issues, including Right2Repair. He provides analysis on North American competitiveness and Canada-Mexico relations. He has written extensively on Canada-China and Canada-U.S. relations, including a chapter in the 2021 edition of **Canada and Great Power Competition: Canada Among Nations**.

Dade was formerly Director for Trade and Trade Infrastructure at the Canada West Foundation and Executive Director of the Canadian Foundation for the Americas, where he created the Canada-Mexico Initiative.

Prior to coming to Canada, he was Director for the Caribbean and Haiti at the Inter-American Foundation, a U.S. foreign aid agency, and began his career as a project administrator at the World Bank in Washington, D.C.

Dade is a Fellow of the Canada West Foundation. He has served as a Senior Fellow and now Honourary Senior Fellow at the School for International Development and Globalization at the University of Ottawa, a Professional Affiliate at the Johnson Shoyama School of Public Policy at the University of Saskatchewan, as non-Resident Senior Associate at the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington, D.C., and a member of the Mexican Council on Foreign Relations.
